The Felix Wild series consists of three captivating historical novels that have all the affectionate humour and vivid sense of place that has made Peter Broadbent's naval memorable character, a boy who lived on the streets until saved from prison by a wealthy businessman, William Kettle. Mr Kettle spots Felix's remarkable talent: he can make a perfect drawing, from memory, of anything that he has seen. In the first book, his skills are put to use in making drawings of the buildings of a a magnificent new iron-clad vessel, *HMS Warrior*. While the men he meets are in awe of his drawing skills, the young women are absorbed in rather less cerebral matters, namely the fit of his fashionably tight 'gas-pipe' trousers and his distinctive looks – one eye is blue, the other green.

In the second book, *Felix Wild and the Blockade Runners*, he is whisked away from the comfortable home of Mr and Mrs Kettle on a dangerous mission into the heart of the American Civil War aboard a blockade-runner; and in the third - *Felix Wild and the Great Tea Race* - he receives an offer from the Admiralty: to travel to China on a clipper in the Great Tea Race of 1866 and to make drawings of what he sees.

In these witty and engaging seafaring novels, Peter Broadbent creates characters worthy of Charles Dickens as well as plots that will keep you turning the pages late into the night.
